SCHOOL CONTEXT STATEMENT

Compass Catholic Community is a learning community for students aged between 17 and 24 who have not thrived in mainstream schooling. Located deliberately in Davoren Park to cater to the young people of the North, we exist for students who have disengaged or disconnected from education and employment, and welcome all genders, races, faiths, and cultures.

Compass is a Catholic diocesan school, and exists as part of the Northern Adelaide Education and Community Services Village, an initiative of the Archdiocese of Adelaide and Catholic Education SA. We opened to students in Term 1 of 2022, in our purpose built facility.

The name of Compass Catholic Community is designed to evoke a sense of the journey that we are all on, individually and collectively. In this sense, a compass is an important tool – it doesn't tell us where to go, or even how to get there – but it points the way. Importantly, if we get to where we are going, and decide to go somewhere else, the compass continues to serve us. There is no 'one direction', no one pathway. A compass helps each of us with our own meaningful journey, and can guide us – to faith, community, grace and mercy.





The unfolding story of the faith community at Compass continued throughout 2022. Below are a few snapshots of the expression of our Catholic Identity.


Our students had the opportunity to prepare Gift Baskets to give to the hard working Health Professionals at the Lyell McEwin Hospital. Students made cards, decided on gifts and prepared beautiful baskets that were gratefully received. This provided the means to speak about the importance of gratitude and blessing in our Catholic Community.

Our stained glass custom made cross was broken through some unintentional but careless student behaviour. The whole space fell silent as people surveyed the shattered pieces on the ground; people swarmed to help clean it up and throw it away. Staff stopped them, and the students asked why were weren't throwing it away. We were able to speak about how even when things are broken, they can be beautiful, and no matter our state, we are loved and valued. The broken pieces sit in our Contemplation Corner, and once our new cross arrived, we displayed them side by side.

Through CESA, we were able to provide feedback reflections on the Recommendations of the 2021 Diocesan Assembly. We did this by taking over one of the white board spaces in the shared area and placing the provided PowerPoint printed out for all to see. Many students stopped to read, engage, ask questions, wonder "who is this Archbishop guy?" and provide their feedback. Students were really interested to hear that the Church wanted to know what they thought! Their top priorities were: how can the Church include all people? How can we care for people and the earth? And, how can the voices of young people be heard by the church?

In preparation for our Community Conversation with Father Philip, we spoke about the Catholic Social Teachings with the student cohort and express how these inform our community here at Compass. Students were then given the opportunity to start to pose questions for Father Philip to answer and these included – Why are there no female priests? Why are there so many contradictions in the Bible? How is Jesus Son, Father and Holy Spirit all at once? And Would Jesus do Burnouts? When Father Philip joined us, the discussion was rich, funny, and sacred.

2022 PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Our work with LBI Foundation

This period we have continued our work and training with the LBI Foundation. This has allowed us to continue our focus on building a Wellbeing and Trauma Responsive community at Compass, with a shared growth intent.

Our long-term intent is students who can meaningfully and intentionally express:

- Agency to act within world, and not just be acted upon, with self-efficacy, selfdetermination, and resilience.
- Connectedness to future, identified family, culture, values, faith exploration, and things bigger than self
- Engagement to identify community, and vocational and education pathways

Our work in this area this year has included:

All new staff trained in the IMPACT Respond Rather Than React: Introduction to Intentional Practice training.

Three staff trained in IMPACT Intentional Practitioner (Coaching) Advance Applications.



The Leadership team working direct with LBI to develop a Student Needs Matrix to help us assess the level of both need and risk when meeting a new student. This is a behind the scene tool that allows us to feel prepared and confident when engaging with complex students, and also bring to light the limitations that we have as a school and ensure that other resources are in place for support of that student.

Staff have also engaged with online professional development offered by LBI including:

- Motivating Others for Intentional Change (Stages of Change Model and Motivational Strategies)
- Preventing and Responding to Child and Youth Anxiety and Depressive Symptoms
- Self Harm and Suicidal Ideation
- Stress, Vicarious Trauma, Burnout and Compassion Fatigue


Our work with Steph Noon - Live Life Coaching

We have had the privilege of working with Steph in some staff meetings to continue to develop ourselves as people as well as professions. We covered topics such as:



The school promotes dialogue about Catholic Identity in a way that is meaningful within our contemporary culture.









